

## Suggested Paints for Julie Read Watercolor Workshops

I use DaVinci, American Journey, Daniel Smith and Winsor Newton professional grade watercolor paints. You do not get the same results with student grade paints.

Paints with an asterisk\* in front are paints I use in workshops. The others I occasionally use.

<b>Yellows</b>	*New Gamboge – T *Quin Gold – T	*Aureolin – T Raw Sienna
<b>Reds</b>	*Scarlet Lake – T Opera – T	*Perm. Rose – T *Alizarin Crimson – T
<b>Blues</b>	*Cobalt Blue – T *Ultramarine Blue – T	*Manganese Blue – T *Prussian Blue – T
<b>Greens</b>	*Sap Green – T	*Viridian – T *Perylene Green – Semi T
<b>Browns</b>	*Burnt Sienna – T *Burnt Umber – T	*Raw Umber – T

KEY T=Transparent      Semi T= Semi Transparent      O=Opaque

### BEGINNERS:

Start out with the Basic Primary Watercolor Set of three 15 ml tubes of American Journey paint: Joe's Blue, Joe's Red and Joe's Yellow. AJBP-set is \$29.99 at [cheapjoes.com](http://cheapjoes.com).

Bring a plastic foam plate for a palette; a plastic container for water; a roll of paper towels.

Brushes: a #8 round, a #10 flat and a rigger or script brush for making thin lines @ Michaels.

Paper: 9x12 Arches cold pressed Watercolor blocks can be bought at Michaels.

### SUGGESTED PAPERS:

Arches watercolor paper 140#, cold pressed, or 9" x 12" Arches cold pressed Watercolor Block

### SUGGESTED BRUSHES:

1" & 2" flat for washes, Rounds #8,12,16; flats #10,18 and a Frank Webb #4 liner

Natural Hair Quill Point Squirrel Brushes, great for foliage with broken edges, Size 2 and 000, can be bought at [www.torringtonbrushes.com](http://www.torringtonbrushes.com) at reasonable prices. (same brush as an Isabey)

### OTHER SUPPLIES:

Mr. Clean Magic Eraser (Dollar Store), palette, spray bottle, paper towels, sketch book, kneaded eraser, painters or artist tape,

1/8" plexiglass board to tape your painting to. Get several sizes cut for you at Lowes.

You need a 14" x 17" to hold a quarter sheet, which is 11" x 15".

You need a 18" x 24" to hold a half sheet, which is 15" x 22".

You need a 24" x 32" to hold a full sheet, which is 22" x 30".
